Just A Little History . . .

Several ladies, mostly from the Elloree area, belonged to the Orangeburg Quilters Guild, and had been going to Orangeburg to participate in quilt activities. As the interest in quilting grew, so did the number of ladies attending the meetings and thus the idea to start a quilt guild in Elloree was born.

The first meeting in Elloree was held on February 12, 1992. Arrangements were made by Dot Shirer to meet at her church, Trinity Lutheran, on Hampton Street. Twelve ladies were present.

At the August 12, 1992 meeting, the subject of a name for the group was discussed. Many names were mentioned and discussed, but the conclusion was *Lake Marion Piecemakers*.

Today the group has grown and meets each month on the second Wednesday of the month. They still meet at Trinity Lutheran Church in Elloree.

Elloree Turf Racing – The Sport of Kings By Tom Livingston

Horses were extremely important to the lives of early settlers of South Carolina. They had been introduced to the colony at least by the early 1500's when the Spanish brought them from their plantations in Haiti to the Port Royal area. By the time the Colony called Carolina was split in two – North and South- in 1710 there were thousands of Europeans living in South Carolina, and some had migrated to the back-country of Orangeburgh

District. Horses were used for work, hunting, and transportation. They herded livestock from this area to the markets in Charleston. As farms grew into plantations the quality of horses increased and at some point horse racing became popular. By 1761 there was a commercial horse breeding farm near the Santee River between Eutawville and Moncks Corner. Race horses used in breeding were imported from England so racing in the area probably started at least by the mid 1700's.

The evidence suggests that the current Elloree Training Center location was used for horse racing before 1772. J. C. Zahn had his Kings Grant of 1,000 acres surveyed that year. On the plat he filed of the area two miles north of Elloree there were two geological depressions named savannahs (now called Carolina Bays). One (now known as Livingston Savannah) was named Hunters Savannah on that plat and the other (Elloree Training Center) was named Race Savannah. The British incursion halted racing in the area during the war.

The St. Johns Jockey Club revived the Sport of kings near Eutawville at Belvidere Plantation in 1936. Other plantations in the area held horse racing events in the early to mid-1900's including several in Calhoun County. The modern Elloree track was built in 1940 when the Belvidere track was to be closed due to the flooding of Lake Marion when many plantations ended up at the bottom of the lake. Races continued in Elloree until about 1950 when para-mutual betting was outlawed by the state and attendance waned.

The track lay dormant until 1960 when the Utmans bought the property and began training activities. Racing has continued uninterrupted since 1962 and annually draws large crowds from around the state to view exciting horse racing. Horses and jockeys from the track have gathered national (notably Chris Antley) and regional (including Mackie Prickett) attention.

The museum has a wonderful permanent display area highlighting the importance of horse racing in Elloree history. Why not plan to participate in this local Sport of Kings event which will be held this year on Saturday, March 19. And while in town drop by the Elloree Heritage Museum and see the racing exhibit and many other fascinating presentations of local history.


