Recollections of the Elloree Trials





Racing enthusiasts and Elloree Trials' supporters gathered at the Museum to learn about the colorful history of horse racing in our community and to honor track owner, long-time trainer, and Trials' coordinator Franklin "Goree" Smith. On March 21 nearly 100 attendees were part of this special evening.



Howard Shirer opened the program by introducing the evening's speakers Irvin Shuler and Howard Shuler. Irvin Shuler was one of the Elloree Jaycees who helped start the Trials in 1963. He recalled events of the early years of horse racing in the area and how the Elloree Trials came into being. Irvin also recounted many amusing personal stories about the efforts to revive the track. The track was built in 1940 on a geological depression called a savannah or Carolina Bay. It had hosted races for 10 years until a ban on para-mutual betting closed the track. Races resumed in the early 60's. Howard Shuler, current President of the Elloree Trials Committee, shared recollections of the varied activities that became part of the Trials' appeal in later years and his vision of what the future may hold.

The Elloree Trials Committee presented Goree with a special plaque honoring his dedication and devotion over the years to the Trials and the community. For many years Goree has presented a check to local organizations who assisted in bringing together different elements of the Trials. Recipients included the Elloree Garden Club, Evergreen Garden Club, Mentor Book Club, the Pythians, Elloree Athletic Association, Lions Club, and Masons. Jaycee Faitsie Bair was recognized for having attended every Trial since 1963.



Special exhibits upstairs in the Museum treated attendees to a visual history of the Palmetto Racing Park and Elloree Trials' site, horses, trainers, jockeys and race activities. These ranged from a special area dedicated to the memory of Elloree native and Kentucky Derby winner Chris Antley to photos, posters,

pictures, newspaper articles, a video presentation and other memorabilia. Included were photos of all the Miss Elloree Trials winners since the first in 1979, as well as many photos of "hosses runnin' over hosses," as often proclaimed by Color Announcer Bob Hill.

The Elloree Training Center presented the Museum with a silver engraved trophy cup that would have normally been awarded to one of the race winners. Known as the Covid Cup, one side is engraved with 2020, for the year that the Trials were canceled by the Governor. The cup is also engraved with 2022, the year the Trials resumed after Covid.

Special thanks go to Bill and Penny Summers for their donation of a historical scrapbook of early horse racing in the area, which is a wonderful addition to the Museum archives. Thanks also go to Logan's Pizza. The restaurant was open the entire evening to accommodate those who wished to dine there before or after the event.

Current Trials Committee President Howard Shuler and many in Elloree and surrounding communities are excitedly working hard to get the Elloree Trials races going again with the goal that they will resume in 2024.

Four Wives of the Founder

The old saying is that behind every successful person is a good partner, usually a spouse. Founder William J. Snider was a very successful man, but he needed four wives to help him get there.

Wife number one was Sarah Helen Rozier from Barnwell District. They were married in Barnwell on August 31, 1854 while Snider was still a resident of Charleston. He was 21 years old and she was 20, having been born on April 7, 1833. She had been educated in a boarding school in Edgefield when she was seventeen. Tragically less than a year after their marriage she died – June 8, 1855. She was buried in the Guess Family cemetery in Bamberg. Her death must have affected William greatly because he did not marry again for five years. When his next two wives died he remarried in less than one year.


Wife number two was Elizabeth (Lizzie) Esther Wells who was from Sumter. He met her through her brother, Samuel, who was a friend of William's when they both worked in Charleston. [Later Samuel worked for William in his Cross Roads Store and then bought a farm near Holly Hill and opened a store in what is now known as Wells Crossroads]. He and Lizzie were married in 1859 and they probably lived in Felderville because he was Postmaster in White Cane near Felderville. The 1960 Census proves that he and Lizzie lived with P.H. Felder in Felderville and that William was a merchant running Felder's Felderville store. Lizzie continued to live with the Felders during the war while her husband was in Richland County and later in the war in Virginia. In 1865 when word reached Felderville that her neighbor, David Shuler, had died in a POW camp in New York, she was among the first to visit his widow.

They moved to Elloree in 1866 and he opened his first crude store. In 1875 Lizzie and William adopted the son of a fellow Baptist minister (Rev. Hartley) whose wife had died. Earle Hartley was just a baby when they adopted him. He outlived both of his adoptive parents, but never married. Lizzie suggested the name for Elloree in the 1870's and that name was used for the community until the town was incorporated as Harlin City in 1886. She was an active member of the community as late as June 1880, but she passed away in 1881 before the town was formed. The museum has the original postcard that she wrote in 1880, a copy of which is included herein.

With a young boy to raise, William married his third wife, Wilhemina (Willie) Farr of Greenville. She had been educated at Greenville Female

College and met William at the Baptist Convention in 1882. They became engaged in less than one week – she was 23, he was 51, and Earl was 7. Willie had serious health issues and required that her personal physician (Dr. Charles Davant) move to Elloree with her. William built a house next door to his home for Dr. Davant. That house still stands in Elloree but it has been moved about a block away from its original place. Willie bore William two children, a son W. Farr Snider in 1883. He died as an infant. Their daughter, Mary Louise Snider was born in 1884 but died in 1886, just one month after her mother, Willie. So 1886 was a terrible year in William's family life, but it was also the year that the town was founded.



William married his fourth wife, Janie E. Holland, on September 27, 1887 in Williston. This marriage lasted ten years, until William's death in December 1897. Jane Snider was the executrix of his vast estate. His adopted son Earl lived until 1902 when he died of pneumonia at age 27. Jane Snider died in 1904. The house that William built in 1870 and that his last three wives lived in is described in a historical marker on Main Street in Elloree. The included photo shows the Snider House with Earl throwing a snowball at Jane and her sister. The photo is probably from the late 1890's. The direct family line of Founder W.J. Snider ended with Jane's death. However the town that he and his family built is a monument to his vision.


