William F. Stack, Jr.

While W.J. Snider was clearly THE founder of Elloree, there were a number of others who were instrumental in the success of the town at its founding. In the next newsletters we will highlight a few who assisted Mr. Snider in the very beginning.

William Frederick Stack, Jr. was one of these original founders of Elloree and one of its leading businessmen for many years. W.J. Snider had the only store in the community which he opened shortly after the Civil War. To create the town Snider offered lots for homes and businesses at affordable prices, and he convinced the railroad to build a spur that came to Elloree in 1886 when the town was chartered. Stack was among the first to purchase lots for a home and business. Moving to Elloree in 1886/87 he opened a mercantile business, The Stack Company.

He was one of the earliest civic leaders and businessmen in the community. In the second town election which occurred in 1888, Stack was elected as one of the town's wardens. The next year he was re-elected. He lived the rest of his life in Elloree and was always active in community affairs.

Stack was born October 19, 1865 in Kingstree, a son of William F. and Wilhelmina Stack, both of whom were immigrants from the European country of Georgia. At an early age he showed his drive towards a career in business and public service. At the age of 14 he left Kingstree to become an apprentice in a German bakery in Sumter, SC. By the time he was 21 his industriousness and character led to an appointment as U.S. Postmaster in Sutton, Williamsburg County, S.C. He was appointed on January 14, 1886 but left the job and moved to Elloree within a year.

As an astute young business man in the infant town he developed a very successful business. By 1896 he was so successful that he was listed as one of the "wealthy and prominent citizens of Elloree" who proposed that Elloree was successful enough to be considered as the county seat for a new county. He later opened several other businesses with other businessmen including the Stack & Ulmer Company in 1901.



Of course, when a small group of the leading citizens of Elloree met in May 1909 to form Elloree Telephone Company, Stack was among them. He was elected Vice-President of that company which provided a valuable service for the community. At some point before 1912 he built the first brick building in Elloree, a building that is still in use today. At that point no citizen had lived in Elloree as long as he had. At age 47 he was the leading businessman and elder statesman of Elloree.

The Stack Cotton Co. was opened in 1920. By then he owned and leased a number of buildings in downtown. He had at least 4 buildings damaged or destroyed by fire in 1921. He was also deeply involved in banking, both in Elloree and in Orangeburg. He was one of the founding officers in the Bank of Elloree in 1904. It was one of the few banks that survived the depression due to the leadership of the Board of Directors, including Stack. He remained Vice-President of the bank until his death in 1948. Stack was also a member of the Board of Directors of the Planters Bank of Orangeburg, a position he held for many years starting in 1910.

Stack was a committed Christian and leader of the Elloree Methodist Church. He was on the committee formed in 1892 that had the task of building the Church on the lot given to the church by his friend and neighbor, W.J. Snider. In that same year he was married to Martha Dorothy Rhodus of Williamsburg County.

He was a leader in many civic and social organizations including the Masons and the Knights of Pythias. He built the most beautiful home in Elloree and that home was used for town social functions and for other community activities including educational functions. That home is still in use today as a funeral home.

Stack was a devoted family man but, like his business life, he was not immune to tragedies – his first three daughters died as infants from illnesses. As in other as-

pects of his life, his family moved forward, eventually raising five children. Even today his family legacy continues with grandchildren and greatgrandchildren who contribute to the Elloree community.



In September 1937, late in his life, he was able to celebrate and enjoy the 50th anniversary of the town that he had helped to found and build. When he died in 1948 his funeral service was held in the church he had started in 1892 and the honorary pallbearers were friends and business associates from Elloree and Orangeburg County.

The name William F. Stack, Jr. should be written on the cornerstone of the town of Elloree because he was a founder, a builder, and a leader of the community.
